







This activity teaches voters in training about the different levels of government (federal, provincial and municipal). Participants will also gain a better understanding of how government affects their daily lives.

OBJECTIVE

Learn about the different levels of government and each one's responsibilities

ICEBREAKER ACTIVITY

Ask participants who they would ask for permission in each of the following situations:

- Spending the weekend at a friend's house.
- Putting up a poster or artwork on a classroom wall.
- Organizing a fundraising campaign to help families in need, at school or in a youth organization.
- Installing basketball hoops in a municipal park.

Help participants realize that decisions don't always rest with the same person or the same entity. The same goes for government: each level makes decisions related to its area of jurisdiction.

A BIT OF THEORY

The government and the decisions it makes affect our daily lives. You don't need to look far to find examples! Our political system includes different levels of government: federal, provincial and municipal. They share powers or jurisdictions.

Federal and provincial jurisdictions

The Canadian Constitution defines the division of powers between the provinces and territories and the federal government. Some jurisdictions are exclusive, but others are shared between the federal and provincial governments.

Examples of federal jurisdictions:

- National defence (Armed Forces, Royal Canadian Mounted Police)
- Postal services
- Money and banking
- Indigenous affairs
- Foreign affairs and trade
- Criminal law

- Employment insurance
- Citizenship
- Passports
- Air, sea and rail transportation
- Telecommunications and broadcasting



Examples of provincial jurisdictions:

- Education
- Hospitals and health care
- Administration of justice
- Civil law
- Vehicle registration and driving licences

- Recreational or sport fishing licenses
- Labour (employment standards, health and safety)
- Birth certificates
- Lotteries
- Highway signage

Examples of shared (federal and provincial) jurisdictions:

- Agriculture
- Immigration
- Transportation

- Culture
- Environment

Municipal jurisdictions

Municipal politics play an important role in our democracy. At this level, elected officials are responsible for issues that are closest to the community.

Examples of municipal jurisdictions:

- Urban planning and development
- Public transit
- Housing, including social housing
- Assistance for the homeless
- Social and community development
- Municipal parks and recreation
- Libraries

- Public safety (police and fire services)
- Residual materials management (garbage collection, as well as waste recycling and reuse)
- Local roads (e.g., street maintenance and snow removal)
- Water and sewer services



SUGGESTED STEPS

- Referring to the section titled "A Bit of Theory," introduce participants to the different levels of government and their respective jurisdictions.
- 2. Draw the group's attention to the squares on the activity sheet. Each square lists a different jurisdiction.
- 3. Working individually, have participants cut out the names of the jurisdictions and then sort them by level of government (federal, provincial or municipal).
- 4. Review the correct answers with the entire group.



ACTIVITY SHEET

The levels game

As you just learned, there are different levels of government. This activity will test your knowledge of the jurisdictions that belong to each level. Each square names a jurisdiction. Sort the squares according to whether they are federal, provincial or municipal jurisdictions.
