







This activity helps voters in training reflect on and discuss the importance of learning about different candidates before voting. It will also help participants understand what information they need to form their own opinion.

OBJECTIVE

Recognize the importance of learning about different candidates.

MATERIAL REQUIRED

- Copies of the Voters in Training activity sheet
- Five "Candidate" cards and one blank card, cut out in advance
- Five "Promise" cards and one blank card, cut out in advance



ICEBREAKER ACTIVITY

Ask participants the following questions:

- What do you base your decisions on?
- What influences your opinions?
- Do you ever change your mind? Why?
- In your opinion, what factors should you consider when voting?

A BIT OF THEORY

Voting is an important choice. Voting gives citizens an opportunity to express themselves on who should represent them and make decisions on their behalf.

However, it can be difficult to take a political stance, even during an election campaign. People often wonder what they should base their opinions on and whom they can trust. A wide variety of factors can influence your opinions. For instance, your point of view may be influenced by:

- your personality;
- your values;
- your experiences;
- your living environment;
- your friends, relatives, etc.;
- your knowledge (or lack of knowledge) about the candidates and what they are proposing.



SUGGESTED STEPS

- 1. Hand out a "Candidate" card to four or five participants and ask them to take turns reading the cards out loud.
- 2. Take a vote by asking the other participants to pick their preferred candidate. Record the results on the board.
- 3. Hold a discussion with participants on what made them choose a particular candidate.
- 4. Next, give a "Promise" card to each of the participants who received a "Candidate" card. Ask them to take turns reading the contents of both cards.
- 5. Take a second vote by asking the other participants to pick their preferred candidate, taking the new information into account. Record the results on the board.
- 6. Start a discussion with participants. Ask them to compare the results of the first and second rounds of voting. Then ask them to complete the Voters in Training activity sheet, which includes the following questions:
 - a) Did the same candidate win both rounds of voting? Why?
 - b) Did you vote for the same person both times?
 - c) If so, why did you not change your mind? If not, why did you change your mind?
