


Provincial election

All you need to know to vote

What is an election?

It is a process by which people who are eligible vote to choose the person who will represent them. That person will be the Member of Parliament for the electoral division.

An electoral division is a territory with approximately 50,000 voters. There are 125 electoral divisions in the province of Québec.



Role of Élections Québec

Élections Québec organizes elections in Québec.



To vote:



Your name must be entered on the list of electors



You must be 18 years of age or older



You must be a Canadian citizen



You must have lived in Québec for at least six months




You must not have lost your election rights

Is your name entered on the list of electors?

Your name and your current address must be entered on the list of electors.

Check to see if your name and current address are entered.

It's your responsibility!




You can check it:

- On the notice of entry you will receive by mail
- Online at <u>www.electionsquebec.qc.ca/en</u>

If your name is not on the list of electors, you can register online.

If you notice an error, you can change your registration.


Important: you must do so before the deadline.




This **notice of entry** is two-sided:

- One side shows the names
 of electors residing at your address
 and entered on the list of electors
- The other side shows the address you should report to if your name is not on the notice or if it is misspelled

Bring your driver's license or two identification documents. They should allow us to verify your name, date of birth and address.


Would you like to vote before election day?

Check your notice of entry to find out where advance polling is available.

There are several options for voting before election day. You can find out more:

- On the website
 at <u>www.electionsquebec.qc.ca/en</u>
- By calling us at 1-888-353-2846

All advance polling locations are accessible to people with reduced mobility. (3)



One week before election day, you will receive a yellow reminder card.

The card is two-sided:

- One side indicates where to vote on election day
- The other side lists
 the names of the people
 you can vote for




Can't get out to vote?

If you have a health problem that prevents you from getting to the polling station, you can vote at home.

To do so, register soon. You must respect the deadline.

To vote at home, write or call the office of your returning officier.


Someone will contact you to set up an appointment.

How do I vote?

Report to the address indicated on:

- The **white** notice for advance polling
- The <u>yellow</u> card for voting <u>on election day</u>

Someone will greet you at the polling location.
They will then point you in the right direction.



Bring one of the following pieces of identification:



Your Québec driver's licence



Your Québec health insurance card



Your Canadian passport



Your Certificate of Indian Status




Your Canadian Forces identification card

At the table, state your name and address and show your identification.

You will receive a ballot paper and a pencil.

Go behind the cardboard polling booth.



On the ballot, make an X, check or mark in the circle next to the name of the person you want to vote for.

Only vote for one person on the ballot paper.


It's OK if your mark extends a bit beyond the circle.

Just make sure it doesn't touch another circle.

Fold the ballot paper and go back to the table.

The person at the table will tell you how to put your ballot paper in the ballot box on the table.

Access to polling locations

On election day, nearly all polling locations are accessible to people with reduced mobility.

You can check whether your polling location is accessible on the www.electionsquebec.qc.ca/en website.




If your polling location is not accessible, please contact your returning officer.

You will be allowed to vote at another location.

The results will be posted on the website at www.electionsquebec.qc.ca/en.




If you want to make a political contribution

Every year,
you can contribute up to \$100
to each authorized political party,
each authorized independent Member
and each authorized independent candidate.

If there is an election in your electoral division during the year, you can donate up to \$200.

Make sure to get a receipt for each of your contributions.




